Available evidence

What evidence/information (both qualitative and quantitative) have you gathered to inform this policy? Specify details for relevant Section 75 categories.

The previous equality screening of the Newry City Centre Regeneration Project carried out in February 2022 set out the details of the consultation and engagement process undertaken by Otium Leisure Consultancy in relation to the current proposals for the regeneration of Newry City Centre.

Survey respondents were asked; 'If you feel there are equality of opportunity, good relations or rural needs implications associated with the Newry City Centre Regeneration Programme, please tell us more.'

A workshop specifically targeting representative regional groups for each of the Section 75 categories listed above was organised as part of the consultation process, however, those organisations which wished to comment chose to respond to the online survey in lieu of attending the workshop.

A total of 262 respondents addressed this question, of which 39 responded no, none or not applicable. The majority of comments were

general in nature and did not relate to specific Section 75 categories or to the implications of these proposals for rural residents. Worthy of note however is the fact that among these more general comments there is a call for better engagement to reinvigorate relationships between stakeholders such as local businesses and the council, and the fact that almost 10% of respondents (24) felt the proposals would lead to an increase in cross border travel and trade.

A total of 12 responses felt there was a potential adverse impact related to age. In the main these comments were about older people and related to the removal of parking at the cathedral which is used by this age group to access services at the cathedral and the city centre. However, reference was also made to meeting the needs of children and young people through the proposals.

A total of 10 responses identified concerns about an adverse impact on the basis of religion, again related to the proposed reduction in parking availability at the cathedral and the impact of this on people's ability to worship.

One respondent raised concerns about the impact of a reduction in parking availability on those with young dependents and a further two respondents were concerned about the impact on those with a disability.

Councillors are elected within seven District Electoral Areas (DEAs) across the Council area. With respect to party political representation, democratic deficits exist within particular DEAs i.e three DEAs have no PUL Councillor representation (Newry, Crotlieve and Downpatrick), two DEAs have one PUL (Slieve Croob and Slieve Gullion) Councillor and, one DEA has one CNR (Rowallane).

Racial group

According to the 2021 Census, 3.4% (65,604) of the usually resident population of Northern Ireland belongs to minority ethnic groups. This is almost double the proportion in 2011 (1.8%).

Dependants

Persons with dependents may be people who have personal responsibility for the care of a child (or children), a person with a disability, and / or a dependent older person.

According to the Census 2021, there are 68,396 households in Newry, Mourne and Down, 33.9% of which have dependent children. With regard to these figures, dependents are defined as those aged 0-15 years or those aged 16-18 years who are in full-time education and living with their parents or grandparents. Similar to the regional trend, the proportion of households with dependents in the District has declined from 50% in 1981 to 33.9% in 2021.

There are 5,639 lone parent households with dependent children in Newry, Mourne and Down which equates to just over 8% of number of total households in the District and is the fourth highest in Northern Ireland, after Belfast (17,292), Derry and Strabane (7,639) and Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon (6,556). Half of the parents in lone parent households in Newry, Mourne and Down are unemployed, almost a quarter are in full time employment and over a quarter are in part time employment. 93% of the parents in lone parent households in the District are female compared to 11% who are male.

In 2019-21, the teenage birth rate (under 20 years old) was 6.5 per 1,000 mothers, which is the fourth highest in Northern Ireland after Belfast (11.4); Antrim & Newtownabbey (6.9) and Mid and East Antrim (6.8) but below the regional average of 6.8 per 1,000 births.
